

CHEATSHEET MINI (TOY) ACCORDION

I got this little 'accordeon' for €18,- at a local shop. Its pretty decent.

NOTES PER KEY:

Notes per key: C, E, G, c, e, g, b. Corresponding letters: D, F, A, B, d, f, a. Key numbers: 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7.

Icons: << push, << pull, << righthand key counting from above

The accordion should be able to play all slow pieces that stay in this range, don't require minor or major (# and b) notes, and can be played with a single voice in solo. Start with beginner flute pieces.

EXTRA KEYS:

The accordion has two keys next to the air valve (lowest key of these three) that produce 4 'sounds', that might pressed together to form two more sounds. I'm weary of calling it chords as I am not sure what notes they produce. If someone knows what notes these keys produce exactly, I would be happy to include & credit them.

PRACTICAL NOTATION:

Goes along with the usual bar notation, written in between the bars. Everyone can play this way. Not perfect but very practical:

Row, Row, Row Your Boat

♩. = 108

Practical notation: \times 3- 3- 3- 4, $\langle \rangle$ 3 4- 4 3 4 5-, 6 6 6 3 3 3 5 4 3, 5 5 5 4 4 4 5 4 3

Basic idea is simple; again above line is push, under the line is pull. A dash indicates longer notes. I personally prefer seeing notes with this notation, but it fits any text editor and might be easily distributed. Shown sheetmusic taken kindly from www.flutetunes.com, so look there for more!
